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Summary facts - detailed below: \$1,329,580 in total grants, contracts, and programmatic donations funding educational outreach to urban students and schools; 20 articles published, 10 in peer-reviewed journals; 1 book published; 14 national and international presentations; 5 years editor of *Curriculum in Context* with 3 national awards; 4 years Chair of Curriculum and Instruction Masters program; 13 graduate and undergraduate courses taught; 16 years as education professor, 12 at Seattle Pacific University; urban alternative schoolteacher and youth minister prior to entering higher education

Director, University Tutors for Seattle Schools (UTSS), a Washington state non-profit corporation, founded in 2012 after obtaining a private donation of \$50,000 to the SPU School of Education to expand tutoring partnerships with urban K-12 schools in Seattle

Total institutional funding from 2012-14: \$819,150 [City of Seattle Families and Education Levy competitive awards (\$619,450, including school-specific Learning Assistance Program allocations), Washington State Urban Turn-around Initiative (\$78,000), an Emerging Schools grant (\$32,000), independently funded school contracts (\$8,700), non-competitive Federal and State Workstudy (\$81,000), and Microsoft employee matching funds.]

Targeted outcomes: Vary by school, but mainly surrounding attendance, grades, MSP (Measures of Student Progress) scores, MAP (Measures of Academic Progress) scores, and district-wide End-of-Course examinations.

Program(s): At Denny International Middle School, continued AVID program small-group tutorial work, and transitioned to a combination of pull-out and push-in assistance in Mathematics classrooms specifically at both Denny and Hamilton International Middle School after 2009. Staffed a new Freshman Achievement Center at Sealth, and undertook tutoring assistance at Ingraham High School at the request of the district.

Outcome(s): UTSS' Mathematics assistance at Denny has corresponded with significant and steady WASL/MSP gains, our targeted academic outcome. Denny's average WASL (now MSP) pass-rates for grades 6-8 rose from 34% in 2008 to 61% in 2011, with substantial gains in linear fashion each year. Program evaluation at Sealth focused on increased Freshman retention and Sophomore promotion, critical indicators of graduation rates.

Sealth's percentage of earning the required 5 credits through passing core and elective courses also rose in unbroken linear fashion from 65% to 89% from 2008-2011.

Project Manager, Southwest Seattle Secondary Pathway Project – (2005-2008):

Funder: Washington Mutual Bank (\$60,000)

Program(s): Created WASL preparation course in Chief Sealth International High School Master Schedule along with 7th hour Mathematics support, all-subject library tutoring, Summer Chemistry Intensives for pre-International Baccalaureate cohort, International Baccalaureate Advisory Board service, and field trips in partnership with SPU's John Perkins Center. AVID (Advancement by Individual Determination) tutoring assistance at Denny International Middle School – a Sealth feeder - added in final year. My involvement varied between 2 and 5 days per week during the program.

Outcome: Increasing 10th grade WASL Mathematics pass rates – required for graduation – through an elective preparation course was the reason for applying for funds and the core of the outreach. Sealth had a 25% pass rate among 2005 Sophomores, and our goal was to build student confidence and capacity for a test they could take up to five times by focusing on raw score improvement over their first sitting. Prior to ending this aspect of the outreach due to passing the 10th grade WASL being eliminated as a graduation requirement in Washington state, the first two cohorts that took the preparation elective averaged a 17% gain in raw scores.
