Working college students do better academically than non-working peers

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Commonly referenced studies suggest that students who work while in school do better academically. The U.S. Department of Labor and the U.S. Bureau of Labor Statistics provide data that supports this claim in their paper titled *Parental Transfers, Student Achievement, and the Labor Supply of College Students*. Regarding students at 4-year colleges, the study found that on average, students who did not work earned a grade point average (GPA) of 3.04, while those who worked 1-20 hours a week earned a 3.13 GPA on average. The study suggests, however, that students should balance time they spend working and time studying, because the average GPA for students at 4-year colleges who worked over 20 hours a week was 2.95, even lower than for those who didn't work ("<u>Parental Transfers, Student Achievement, and the Labor Supply of College Students</u>").

Students may do better academically when they also work a job because the little free time they have forces them to manage their time effectively and efficiently. Their time is precious, and they make it count by spending much of it studying, leading to higher grades. Additionally, in the article *Study Finds Students with Part -Time Jobs Get Better Grades,* Kayla Soper reasons that "Twenty hours a week will most likely give you the motivation to be productive with your free time, while working too much will give you no free time."
