What does a day look like at work for you? Every day is literally different. I typically process specimens like blood and urine for research studies; this means a lot of trips to the clinic in order to pick up the samples. With the study and biorepository samples comes paperwork that must be entered into the databases and kept on file. I also do a lot of side tasks, where the "assistant" part of my job comes into play. Some of these tasks include but aren't limited to, autoclaving biohazardous wastes, making phosphate buffered saline (PBS) solution, washing lab dishes, restocking supplies, inventorying the freezers that contain the blood specimens, etc. And when all of these tasks have been fulfilled I am able to move onto a project I got to start last quarter, where I cut fixed soft and bone tissues on the microtome, stain it and produce a slide from it for the lab's pathologist to review it.

What motivates you to go to work?

The *environment* in which I work in and the people who *surround me*. I absolutely love that my position is a part of something both *meaningful and beneficial* and bigger than myself, where we are trying to become one step closer to finding *a cure for prostate cancer* as well as broaden our very understanding of the disease itself.

A Word From Her Supervisor: Jennifer Noteboom

When asked why she likes to hire college students, Jennifer noted that this type of work "allows science majors to get experience working in a lab setting." She also noted that it "enables us to have more help for a lower cost for the lab" which in return frees up funds for other expenses related to medical research. Jennifer's advice to students looking for a job is to "try to always present yourself in the most confident light" — she always looks for students who are not only capable but also confident when she is hiring for her lab.
