# Ways of Knowing in the Humanities

#### Mission

**Ways of Knowing in the Humanities (WHK)** courses address the kinds of knowing embodied in the uniquely human system of meaning and representation. Employing a foundational understanding of one disciplinary perspective in the humanities, students will examine selected profound human questions expressed by language and manifested in culture.

### Requirements

- 1. All WKH courses will adopt Goal 1, and meet at least one of the objectives for Goal 1.
- 2. All WKH courses will also adopt *either* Goal 2 *or* Goal 3, meeting the full set of objectives under that goal.

## **Goals and Objectives:**

**Goal 1**. Students will experience God's gift of human insight, language, and culture.

**Objectives for Goal 1:** At the conclusion of a WKH course, students will be able to do at least one of the following:

- 1. Demonstrate the ability to read and write with insight and rigor;
- 2. Craft meaningful interpretations and effective arguments and demonstrate the critical intellectual skills that foster ethical decision-making; or
- 3. Demonstrate appropriate mastery of discipline-specific language skills.
- **Goal 2.** Students will demonstrate effective and appropriate communication.

**Objectives for Goal 2**: At the conclusion of a WKH course with Goal 2, students will be able to accomplish all of the following

- 1. Express original and creative thought;
- 2. Communicate ideas persuasively through writing (ranging from linguistic exercises to formal papers) and/or speech (ranging from structured discussion to formal presentations); and
- 3. Apply discipline-specific terminology and methodologies.

**Goal 3.** Students will explore fundamental questions of what it means to be human through an introductory study of influential and important written works.

**Objectives for Goal 3**: At the conclusion of a WKH course with Goal 3, students will be able to accomplish all of the following:

- 1. Identify and articulate the importance of major texts, figures, and milestones in the given subject area; and
- 2. Demonstrate an understanding of how historical and cultural contexts affect human interaction and civilization.

### **Course Criteria:**

1. WKH courses will have no stated prerequisites (outside of normal criteria for foreign language and writing placement).
