<u>Dissertation</u>: "Civic Participation in Indonesia: Islam, Community and Rural Development."

Description: My dissertation investigates the link between civic participation and community development in Indonesia. The project addresses the way that structural inequities may prevent poorer households from fully participating in the advancement of their community. This connection between civic action and community development has important implications for how the country attempts to complete its democratic transition and consolidation. These issues are important aspects of the larger debate on the compatibility of Muslim cultures and democratic values. More specifically, this study aims to clarify the factors that motivate democratic civic behaviors among Indonesians, the likelihood that these forms of engagement are sustainable over time and the role that Islam plays in fostering civic networks that support these democratic and development-related practices.

<u>Thesis</u>:"Race, Culture and Social Status: Residential Segregation among Foreign-born Blacks in the United States"

Description: This thesis explored both the extent and the social determinants of residential segregation among foreign blacks in the U.S. I found that differences in social status very much exist among black immigrants and they significantly affect residential segregation. First, foreign-born blacks are not only segregated from native whites, but also from each other. Second, foreign blacks enjoy a slight advantage over native born blacks due to the combined effects of occupation and income. I attribute the root of this advantage to a different cultural orientation among foreign blacks. Furthermore, the results from the regression models indicate that some of the key assumptions of the assimilation tradition no longer hold. This study brings in question the importance of the cultural assimilation debate and the place of the Chicago School within that debate.
