In Memory Of Rose Reynoldson 1928-2015 ...

Recharging Writers: English Professor Offered Encouragement, Publishing Tips

Professor Emerita of English **ROSE REYNOLDSON** died July 22 in Wenatchee at the age of 87. She taught English, creative writing, and poetry at Seattle Pacific University for more than 15 years before retiring in 1993.

Reynoldson grew up in rural Western Washington during the Great Depression, where she and her family lived in a chicken-shed-turned-house without running water. She married Elmer Reynoldson not long after World War II, and they became parents to five children. Near midlife, Reynoldson began taking night classes in writing. By 1971, she'd earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Washington; by 1974, she'd added a master's degree in creative writing. In 1977, she became an SPU faculty member.

Known for encouraging her students to excel at writing poetry and fiction, Reynoldson also founded the SPU Christian Writers Conference in the 1980s. Until being absorbed by the Northwest Christian Writers Renewal in 2008, the conference welcomed writers of all levels to Seattle Pacific's campus to increase their craft, network, and connect with agents and publishers.

"Her vision benefited hundreds of writers from all over the country who came back year after year," says **LINDA WAGNER MEd '92**, **PhD '12**, former co-director of the SPU Christian Writers Conference.


The author of *I Know There's Something More*, a collection of her poems and stories, Reynoldson returned to campus many times after her retirement to meet with faculty, students, and alumni. "I've known her since 1972, when we met in graduate school at the University of Washington," says Emeritus Professor of English and Reynoldson's longtime friend, Tom Trzyna. "A more encouraging and inspiring person you could not find."

Reynoldson is survived by Elmer, her husband of 68 years, three sons, two daughters, 14 grandchildren, and 18 great-grandchildren, including **MELODY MILLETTE** '**o**7.

In memory of ...



David Vernon Englund 1937—2015... David is the beloved spouse of Emerita Professor Ruby Englund, School of Nursing, retired 2007. David was born in Seattle, Graduated from Franklin High School and Seattle Pacific College, majoring in Industrial Arts Education and minoring in Art. He earned a masters degree from San Jose state and taught Industrial Arts at Ballard High School for over ten years. He became a remodeling contractor and bought properties that he remodeled and rented out. Throughout his life he was a collector amassing a huge collection of antique woodworking tools, early New England town histories, Native American artifacts and craftsmen's account books.

He served as a Sunday school superintendent and on church boards. He served on the Alumni Council at Seattle Pacific University and became a Fellow and member of the President's Circle. He served on the board of the Early American Industries Association and co-authored a publication of photos of antique tools. He was a frequent traveler with a special interest in Egypt, the Holy Land, and England. He was an avid sports fan at SPU especially of the Women's Basketball Team. He is survived by his wife, Ruby, children Rebecca Wendfeldt and Danial Wendfeldt, a brother John Englund, several nieces and nephews and cousins. His sister Roberta preceded him in death in 1993. His memorial was at First Free Methodist Church.

Emeritus Professor Jack Lattin passed away on October 18, 2015 at age 94. He was raised in Seattle and joined the Navy in 1942 as the pilot of a carrier-based fighter plane. He flew 123 missions and was awarded the Navy Cross in 1946 for extraordinary heroism. He married Sylvia Andvik in 1944 and she passed away in 1999. After teaching high school, he taught accounting at SPU from 1977-1986. He was also named SPU Teacher of the Year. He is survived by two daughters, Kris Pepper and Kay Lattin, grandchildren Tyler and Heidi, nephew Terry Lattin, and others. Many former students posted on his online obituary. Here are two of them:

"Jack Lattin was my accounting professor at Seattle Pacific University in 1981. He provided me with needed help in his accounting class and even matched me up with a tutor so that I would do well in his class. I graduated with honors from SPU, and he is a big reason why I earned my degree."

"Mr. Lattin was my high school accounting teacher from 1969 to 1971. At the time, I never imagined that I would end up being an accountant, but I did. And it has been a career that I have enjoyed and that has served me well. I have Jack Lattin to thank for giving me the foundation upon which I built my career."

In memory of Marthanna Elvidge Veblen 1920-2015....

While Ms. Veblen was not faculty, she will be remembered as Librarian at Seattle Pacific College and then Seattle Pacific University. She passed away September 3, 2015, in Seattle. (Since then, librarians are part of the faculty)

Did You Know? by Adrienne Meier, University Archivist, SPU Library

Seattle Seminary students began publishing a monthly literary journal in December of 1910. The journal, called the *Cascade*, included student written stories, poems, and essays, as well as reports of student clubs and items of school news. The *Cascade* was published monthly from 1910 until 1916, with the June issues of each year functioning as the yearbook and including faculty and student photos. In 1917, the *Cascade* became the student yearbook and was issued annually. Student-authored literary works were published in the *Falcon* until 1961, when *Essence*, the ASSP-published literary journal was established. *Essence* included poems, essays, photographs, artwork, and musical scores; the journal was published annually. The name was changed to *Second Essence* in 1978 and in 2003, issues of *Second Essence* began including a CD of student-written and performed songs. In 2005, the name of the literary journal was changed to *Lingua*, the title the journal holds today. Faculty advisors for *Essence, Second Essence*, and *Lingua* included: Alice Thorn, Larry Metcalf, Carl Reed, Fan Gates, Leon Arksey, Rose Reynoldson, Janet Knedlik, and current SPU faculty members Jennifer Maier and Doug Thorpe.

Here is a poem from the 1913 Cascade called The New Year by Addie Patterson, class of 1916

Listen! What's the noise?
O, That's the death knell.
Dying, dying, dying.
Softly the tones swell
Out in the night so cold,
The last night of the old, old
Year is dying, dying, dying.
