President's Corner: George Scranton

I don't know about anyone else, but I feel that I have just flunked the spring quarter of my freshman year of my so-called retirement. I just finished directing *Talley's Folly* for SPU's backstage show, and am trying to finish my Theatre Capstone class papers and get grades in on time.

I have had the joy of re-visiting *Talley's Folly* after directing it 20 years ago. It is a comedy of hope for finding mutuality in a loving relationship. And for me it is in the form and shape of a dance.

Christopher Fry noted that "Comedy is an escape, not from truth but from despair: a narrow escape into faith. . . there is an angle of experience where the dark is distilled into light. . . where our tragic fate finds itself with perfect pitch, and goes straight to the key in which creation was composed. And Comedy senses and reaches out to this experience. It says, in effect, that, groaning as we may be, we move in the figure of a dance, and, so moving we trace the outline of the mystery..." (of mutuality in relationship). For Fry (and for me) that human dance is a metaphor for the divine-human dance of loving relationship. When we can be fully open and honest about who we are, and who God is we can enter into a wonderful dance of relationship with God, and with one another.

Matt (a main character in the play) says: "If everything goes well for me tonight, this should be a waltz, one-two-three, one-two-three; a no-holds-barred romantic story, and since I'm not the romantic type, I'm going to need the whole valentine here to help me: the woods, the willows, the vines, the moonlight, the band—there's a band that plays tonight, over in the park. . ."

I have long believed that dance is a moving metaphor for how we grow into relationship. Some relationships are fairly simple two-step dances, and we fall into step relatively readily. Other relationships are much more complex, and learning how to "dance" with your partner becomes a more complex series of steps and movements. In the process we may clumsily miss-step and land on our partner's toes. We may move away from and back towards that partner as we learn the necessary movements that match the music. But when we finally can listen to their music, become comfortable with the steps, without needing to count every step we take, and dance together in synchronized motion, we also "trace the outline of the mystery" of mutuality in relationship with God and others.

King George Becomes President George: Introducing George Scranton

After playing King Lear spring 2015, George Alfred Scranton was elected emeriti president spring 2016. He was first hired part-time in 1970 to "fill-in" for James (Jim) Chapman during Jim's doctoral work. He went full-time in 1974 and spent his entire career with us, retiring emeritus professor of theatre in 2015.

George holds a PhD and two MA degrees, graduating from SPC in 1969. One tires easily when reading his 29 page vita, noting all the formal education, workshops, teaching experience, honors, awards, professional activities, service to church and university. The vita has more catego-

ries than many scholars have separate achievements. He was nominated numerous times for inclusion in Who's who Among America's Teachers: The Best Teachers in America Selected by the Best Students.

Dr. Scranton brought delightful balance to his scholarship, seen relatively early with his focus on Job in his first MA and humor (*Love and Lovers in Moliere's Vision of Comedy*) in his second. In his doctoral dissertation he focused on two of his life-long passions: drama and theology.

Part of George's legacy is one of Seattle's many fine theaters, Taproot Theatre, founded by SPU theatre graduates Scott and Pam Nolte. Fittingly, George's stage adaptation of C.S. Lewis's *The Lion, The Witch, and the Wardrobe, written earlier for a touring production by the SPC Chancel Players,* was voted the "Most Memorable" production in the 25 years of Taproot's touring production program.

We asked George questions about his life and career. Here are his responses:

Tell us about your goals for the next year related to the emeriti faculty presidency. Beyond figuring out what being president of the Emeriti Faculty really entails, I have a desire to find ways to increase interaction among ourselves and with current faculty. Also, I want to continue to push for a designated place on campus where we could gather, with desk, chair, computer, etc. It seems to me that one of the things that we often miss when we retire is the camaraderie we have had with our (now) former colleagues on campus. Also, might there be a way we could gather in less formal ways by way of a "Facebook group" of emeriti (and current faculty who might also like to stay in touch with us)?

What are some of the things that keep you spiritually fit? For many years Claire and I have met with a small group made up of three clergy and spouses, and former SPU head librarian Bryce and wife Bonnie Nelson for a "book group." We focus on books of theological import, and other times we just "read Bible" for our monthly meetings. At our meetings we first eat together (see Acts 3), and then we discuss the book for that month. Further, I have been involved in the "worship planning team" for First Covenant Church and teach some of the Adult Christian Formation class Sunday mornings. This year we have been focusing on prayer. We just finished with "Praying the Psalms," and are now involved in "Prayers made Flesh: Praying the Gospels." I also continue to read Scripture during worship and do the "Children's Time" on a regular basis.

In your "free time," what do you like to do? Time spent in our garden is rewarding. I tend to plant between 500 and 2000 bulbs of various kinds each fall. I then treat them with a certain "benign neglect" over the winter, and marvel at their gratuitous blossoming the following year. It is then that I can bring in some of those hundreds and hundreds of flowers to brighten our home inside. The "weeding" part of the enterprise is not my favorite time, but Claire works hard at that too, so it isn't just my garden.

Of course Claire and I enjoy traveling. Last summer we took a Viking River Cruise down the Saône River and Rhône Rivers to Avignon and added a few days in Nice. This August we are scheduled to take another Viking cruise from Passau to Budapest, with extra days in Prague and Budapest.



In memory of our dear colleagues:



<u>Professor Emeritus Chuck Burris</u>. Charles Burris, professor emeritus of computer science, passed away on February 12 in Indio, California. Chuck became the second full-time faculty member in the Computer Science Department in 1982, and served as interim director of the Information Systems Management Program. He was instrumental in organizing the first student computer club, and he helped organize the first programming competitions held in the Computer Lab in the Miller Science Learning Center (now known as Otto Miller Hall). In 1996, he organized and coached the first-ever SPU student team to compete in the West Coast regional programming competition. He retired from SPU in 2006. His wife, Pat Burris, passed away almost four months after her husband on June 9, 2016. See below.

<u>Pat Burris</u>. Pat Burris passed away during the night of June 9, 2016, after a long battle with cancer. Pat is the wife of Emeritus Computer Science faculty member Dr. Chuck Burris who passed away on February 12, 2016. Daughter Cindy Burris (SPU, '96) passed away in 2011, afflicted with Crohn's disease. Prayers of support for daughter Dr. Krista Burris.

Professor Emeritus Hubert Wash. Hubert Wash, professor emeritus of music, passed away on January 21. He was at SPU from 1951-55, 1976-79, and 1981-88. Part of a tribute for Hubert upon his retirement in 1988 stated, "The 14-year investment Hubert Wash has made at Seattle Pacific University has enriched the lives of many students, making them more disciplined and harmonious servants of Jesus Christ...his colleagues in the School of Fine and Performing Arts and throughout the University have found him a wise and affirming mentor, both encouraging and enabling continuous growth in effective service." David McKenna spoke at his memorial service and said "King David is known as the "Sweet Singer of Israel." His songs in the Psalms take us to the heights of exalted praise and to the depths of humble confession. Hubert shared that gift with David. What greater tribute can we bring than to say that his life and his voice made him the "Sweet Singer of Free Methodism." Hubert's wife, Georgia, passed away in 2012.

<u>Dr. Don Demaray</u>, Former Dean of the School of Religion, died October 31, 2015, in Wilmore Kentucky. The son of former SPU President C. Dorr Demaray, he served at SPU for 14 years as faculty member, director of the School of Missions and Dean of the School of Religion. He also served on planning committees for Weter Memorial Hall and Demaray Hall. After leaving SPU, he served 34 years at Asbury Theological Seminary in Kentucky. A memorial service was held November 6, 2015.

<u>Danna Wilder Davis</u>, wife of the late Emeritus Professor of Religion Joseph Davis, passed away March 4 at the age of 97. A 1939 alumna, she completed first grade through college in 15 consecutive years—1924 to 1939—on the Seattle Pacific College campus. Apparently, the elementary school and high school were on campus for SPU-trained student teachers since the public schools at that time did not accept student teachers from religious schools. A longtime supporter of SPU, she was featured in the 2003 winter edition *Response* magazine. A memorial service was held on Saturday March 12, 2016, at Warm Beach Senior Community in Stanwood, Washington.
