# Rev. Dr. R Blake Wood at Spring Tea 2012

# Reprise of Warm Beach luncheon for emeriti faculty



## Directions to Warm Beach and other details

From South: I-5 north to Exit 206, Lakewood/Arlington exit. Turn west (State Highway 531). After 2 miles you will come to a stop sign. Merge (right) onto the Lake Goodwin Road. At Lake Goodwin, Highway 531 will turn south. Do NOT turn. Continue on Lake Goodwin Road to the west for approximately 4 miles. The next stop sign will be Marine Drive. Turn right (North) on Marine Drive for 1 1/2 miles and you will see a vellow caution (blinking) light. This is the entrance (to the left) into the Senior Com-

munity. As you enter the community, continue straight ahead to the Beachwood wing. (Parking at Beachwood is limited). You may want to park to the left as you enter and then walk. Signs will direct you to the Soundview Office where there is ample parking. We will try to have someone in front of the Soundview Office giving further directions to Beachwood.

From North. Drive to Stanwood, take Marine Drive south to the Warm Beach Senior Community (4.5 to 5 miles). Continue south to the third entrance into the Community and then follow above instructions.

# **WELCOME NEW EMERITI 2012!**

Lucille Kelley retired as Dean of the School of Health Sciences and Associate Professor of Nursing. She earned her B.S.N. from the University of Connecticut in 1969, her M.N. from the University of Washington in 1973 and her Ph.D., 1990. Lucille has been at SPU since 1985. The "Grow Our Own" program, brainchild of Dr. Kelley, was launched in 2007. It is an innovative way for Seattle Pacific University's School of Health Sciences to increase its number of PhD-qualified faculty and attracting new staff at the same time. According to the SPU website, "It's a long-term investment that helps solve the faculty shortage problem," Kelley says. "Grow Our Own makes it possible for present and future faculty to pursue their doctorate. The end result is win-win for our students, as our already highly qualified clinicians acquire greater levels of scholarship, regard for research, and teaching skills."

Philip Prins retired from Computer Science, retiring as Associate Professor of Computer Science, Computer Engineering Coordinator. With a PhD in electrical engineering and MS in Computer Science from the University of Idaho, Phil is both an engineer and a computer scientist. He also has degrees in Mathematics and Botany. We could also call him a world traveler, mountain climber, scout-master and Presbyterian elder. He does it all. Phil and his wife, a nurse, share a passion for missions and just might be spending a good deal of their retirement time in emerging countries. As shared by Elaine Weltz at his retirement celebration in early May, he is also a daily bike commuter from north Bothell, an avid mountain climber and former president of the Everett Mountaineers. He is also a member of the Highpointers Club and has reached the high points, including Denali, of all 50 states.

Dick Smith retired in the 2011-12 school year. On Sept. 9, 2011, the School of Education honored retiree Richard E. "Dick" Smith at an open house celebration in the Fine Center at First Free Methodist Church. This was in recognition of his 23-year tenure at SPU. He was Chair of Educational Leadership and P.E.A.B. Dick worked as a tireless advocate of educational leaders across the state of Washington. He taught countless principals, program administrators, and superintendents during his time at SPU, making a vast impact on education in Washington State. He received his B.A. degree from Seattle Pacific College in 1963, his M.A. degree from the University of Oregon in 1968 and his PhD in 1972. He was a professor at SPU from 1988 to 2011.

Les Steele (Gail) formerly VP Academic Affairs (2012) and formerly Dean of the School of Theology. Though Dr. Steele is not officially retired (he actually resigned to take another job), he was granted emeritus status after 27 years of service at SPU with 16 of those in the School of Theology followed by eleven years as VPAA. He says, He got his start in Christian Higher education at Illinois' Wheaton College, followed by work at Azusa Pacific in Southern California. He worked as a pastor while attending graduate school.

Currently he is the Executive Vice President for the Northwest Commission on Colleges and Universities. This is the primary regional accrediting body for all colleges and universities in the Pacific Northwest. His role is to serve the Commission and member institutions in a way that advances the work of accreditation in order to preserve and improve the quality of student learning at the institutions. Dr. Steele says, "During my time as VPAA, I became quite involved with Commission work as an evaluator and ultimately as a chair for a number of accreditation visits. I found the work quite rewarding as a way to come to know great ideas from other institutions as well as a way to advance the desire to continuously improve student learning." Of his SPU emeritus status, Dr. Steele says "Believe me, I miss being on campus with all the great colleagues and students. I am very grateful that faculty, Phil Eaton and the Board granted me emeritus status...That is a wonderful gift and I will be involved when the time comes. I miss SPU yet will always be a part of SPU."

# **EMERITI FACULTY UPDATES JUNE 2012:**

Robert (Bob) Chamberlain (Betty) retired from Communication and Journalism 1999. Bob and his wife Betty had a lot to look back on [we still live on South Hill Puyallup] from 2011-12. Here's a sampling, with a little background:
Background: we met at Cascade College as freshmen and married after graduation in 1961, which means that our 50th wedding anniversary was August 26, 2011. We did celebrate that, with visits from several members of the SPU faculty, at Puyallup United Methodist Church, where we attend regularly and are active in such things as the Library Committee, the annual mystery dinner theatre performance (those two are both Bob), Outreach Ministries Committee (that one has both of us busy), the bell choir (that's Betty), and other events.

He's now what passes for "normal" and ready for almost anything, even if a little slow.

David Dickerson (Betty Ann) retired from English Department and OAA 1992. China – Again. On April 10, 2012, I flew to Chongqing, China, one of the five autonomous cities, for an international job fair (at Chinese expense...). Many schools in Chongqing are interested in hiring "foreign experts," and I am representing Educational Referrals and Resources – China. I was back home on April 15.

Ruby Englund (David) retired from School of Health Sciences 2007.
